

Chauvin Innocent of George Floyd's Death

To: Epoch Times Editorials

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I carefully watched about 95% of the Court TV [13-3] broadcast of Derek Chauvin's trial, including jury selection. I took about two dozen pages of notes. Had I been in the jury (I would not have been selected because I support the common law principle that a jury can rule a law to be bad—the final balance on power—before the second amendment militia), I would have argued for Chauvin's innocence of all charges. I was convinced by the Defense arguments, evidence, witnesses; as well as by some common sense that wasn't broached.

I have been extremely disappointed that no one in the conservative media that I'm aware of [I listen nearly every waking hour] came even close to this conclusion. Rather, they stuck with the first-impression terrible optics, which is exactly the establishment narrative—which has a near 100% lying record. Propaganda is all they know. That, alone, should have been enough of a red flag to alert the vigilant conservative hosts to dig deep to unveil the truth. That's what I did.

Here's how I summarized it on pp. 3, 4 of Appendix B-1, "Societal Tipping Points" of my new book, None to One: Evoking the Repentance Clause of Prophecy, available from IndComing.com. (No, Epoch Time's letting me mention this does not constitute an endorsement by them. This editorial is a tip of the iceberg of how I push the envelope in my book.)

What killed George Floyd was a combination of several factors. The Fentanyl he ingested slows respirations, when he needed to be increasing his breathing rate, when being put in the back of the squad car, resisting because

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his claustrophobia evoked a panic response. That's why he said, "I can't breathe" four times, as the four officers struggled unsuccessfully to get him into the back of the car. Also, the Meth he ingested causes the heart to beat faster and stimulates artery constriction. His autopsy showed that the main artery going to the musculature of his heart was 90% occluded/blocked. Constricting it further would not be good. Carbon monoxide coming from the tail pipe about 18 inches from his face may have also contributed to reducing his ability to get enough oxygen. The prone position, with Chauvin and two of his fellow officers restraining him by an established police method; using their body weight, also contributed, but was not close to the primary contributing factor. After they found no pulse, Floyd did the autonomic anoxic [oxygen-deprived] seizure, kicking his legs. The officers interpreted that as continued resistance, and thus stayed on top of him. They were expecting EMS to show up any second. (That day, they took much longer than usual.) The crowd's response to the awful optics created a stress that caused a fight-or-flight response in Chauvin, draining a percentage of blood from his cognitive brain. Therefore, he wasn't able to think clearly to realize they should get off and perform CPR. The crowd's unwarranted racial ire thus created a negative feedback loop that hindered the otherwise competent officers from performing what could have been a resuscitative measure as had been done in a similar instance earlier in Floyd's life. It was society's reverse racism that resulted in Floyd's avoidable demise.
